# BRITAIN'S CREDIT SQUEEZE

### Chancellor's New Appeal To Bankers

Mr. Harold MacMillan, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, took the unusual step last night of calling together at the Treasury an influential group of about thirty bankers and others and making a new appeal to them to assist in the credit squeeze by maintaining a strict curb on their advance. advance.

In effect, it means, states the P.A. Lobby Correspondent, that the volume of credit will be restricted further.

This is the first such meeting that has ever taken place.

# Medical Profession To Meet On Friday

-Corporation Told

T was announced by the City Manager (Mr. P. Monahan) at a Cork Corporation meeting last night that there would be a meeting of the medical profession on Friday next in connection with the polio, outbreak which would be attended by an inspector of the Department of Health. He also announced that extra hospitalisation would be provided if necessary. In regard to the polio figures it was stated by Dr. Goold, R.M.S., St. Finbarr's Hospital, last night, that the figures had now grown to 58 confirmed and 11 suspects, as compared with yesterday's 55 and 14 respectively. One former suspected case was eliminated yesterday. A statement has also been issued as a result of a discussion between Dr. Saunders, City M.O.H.; Dr. McCarthy, County M.O.H., and Dr. Goold, R.M.S., St. Finbarr's Hospital, advising ten ways to reduce a spreading of the infection.

In the course of the joint statement of the doctors it is mentioned that a number have not developed paralysis, while in the great majority of those who have it is not an intense type and good recovery is anticipated.

## **JORDAN** DEFENCE TALKS BEGIN

The British Foreign Office last night issued a joint Anglo-Jordan communique, which has also been released in Amman.
The communique reads: "Meetings have commenced of the Anglo-Jordan Joint Defence Board to co-ordinate matters of defence between representatives of the British and Jordan forces. This Board, as is well known, was established by the Anglo-Jordan treaty of 1948 and meets from time to time, as occasion requires."
