

Two Cypriot boys, aged 9 and 13, pleaded guilty yesterday to bomb-throwing, and were each sentenced to 12 strokes of the cane. Their parents were fined £5 each.

**GREEK PROTEST.**

Greece yesterday protested to the United Nations against what it called the "outrageous profanation" of the Greek Cypriot cemetery in Nicosia in a British search for hidden arms on June 27th.

The British delegation to U.N. later replied with a statement, declaring that the search of the cemetery had resulted in the discovery of revolver ammunition, and that a youth carrying a revolver was arrested.—Reuter.

**KIDNAP CASE—F.B.I. TAKE OVER**

The Federal Bureau of Investigation yesterday took over the task of solving the Weinberger baby kidnapping case, Reuter reports from Washington.

Under American law, the Bureau, whose agents are the "G-men" of films, could not intervene until yesterday—a week after baby Peter Weinberger was stolen from outside his home at Westbury, New York.

The law provides that after this period it may be assumed that the kidnapper has taken his victim out of the State and is thus liable under the inter-State kidnap law—the so-called Lindbergh Law—which carries the death penalty on conviction.

**DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT**

A brief announcement from the F.B.I.'s director, Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, said: "The F.B.I. has now actively entered the investigation of the kidnapping of Peter Weinberger, and its full resources have been made available with a view to effecting a solution of the case."

Mr. and Mrs. Morris Weinberger, the child's parents, received a 2,000 dollars (£720) ransom demand, but all efforts to contact the kidnapper failed. Local police have admitted they have no clue.

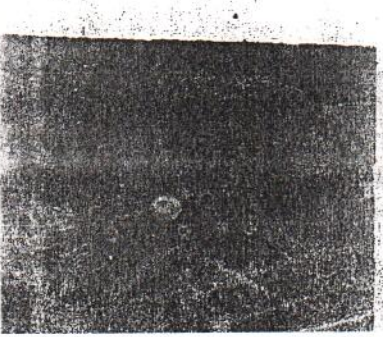
**ANOTHER HOAXER**

Police yesterday arrested a 34-year-old woman in a Brooklyn sweet shop after intercepting a telephone call to the Weinberger home. She told them she had been a patient in a mental home.

Police quoted her as saying she knew the man who kidnapped the baby and that he was at Stamford, Connecticut. But they said they were so sure she was another hoaxer that they did not bother even to tell Stamford police.

The woman is the third person to be arrested and charged with hoaxing investigators.

**15 Polio Cases Reported In Cork**

**Outbreak Not Yet Dangerous, Says Doctor**

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"THE polio outbreak in the city certainly looks like worsening," said Dr. M. A. Gould, R.M.S., St. Finbarr's Hospital, Cork, last night, to an "Examiner" reporter, but added that it had not yet reached dangerous proportions.

Late last night the figures were 15 positive cases with 5 suspected ones.

Yesterday was a particularly bad day with a number of suspected cases and one positive case being reported. At four o'clock there were fourteen positive and one suspected case. By six o'clock this had risen to fifteen positive and three suspected, and late last night to 15 positive and five suspected.

**FIGURES NEARLY DOUBLED**

The outbreak was first disclosed on July 5th with six positive cases. Nothing was reported the following day, but on the 7th came a suspected case. There were some over the week-end, but Monday afternoon brought the figures to eight positive and one suspected. Since then (only three days), the figures have almost doubled.

Districts from which cases have been confirmed are: Ballinlough Road, Friars Walk area, Glasheen Road and College Road. From these districts have come thirteen confirmed cases and one unconfirmed. One confirmed case comes from Gurranebraher.

**Prizewinners At Llangollen**

All the prizes in the first main competition, for folksong parties, at Llangollen International Eisteddfod yesterday went to overseas competitors.

The first prize, an international trophy, was awarded to a doublet from Belgrade, Yugoslavia, who scored 187 marks. Second prize went to Karlskoga, Sweden, with 181, and third to Klagenfurt, Austria, with 180.

In the instrumental folk-solo group a party from Corunna, Spain, were first, while the open folksong solo was won by a Czech.

**Dulles Calls On To Free "Satellite" Countries**

**The Campaign To Undo Evil Done In Stalin's Name**

**MR. DULLES**, U.S. Secretary of State, yesterday called on the Soviet Government to restore independence to the "satellite" countries as part of its campaign to undo evils committed under Stalin.

He said in a prepared statement read before television cameras at his regular Press conference that the people were "entitled to be assured that the evil done in Stalin's name will be undone and that such policies will not recur."

Mr. Dulles pointed out that, apart from the sufferings of the Soviet people under Stalin, other peoples had been "brought into grievous captivity."

Mr. Dulles also said that new "forces now at work" in the Soviet Union would prove to be irresistible.

Without defining the new forces, he said that that did not mean changes would occur to-day or to-morrow. He did not think that a sudden transformation would come about, but he thought that they could hopefully look forward to a transformation of the international scene.

**CURRENT POLICIES**

Replying to questions, he acknowledged that current Soviet policies could be reversed at any time because they did not depend on the consent of the governed. But there were processes at work which would require policies to be responsive to the wishes of the people and at some point those policies would become irreversible.

**Research On Insect**

Dr. Fergus J. O'Rourke, Prof. of Zoology, University College, Cork left yesterday for two months' search in Arctic regions.

Professor O'Rourke was invited by Mr. R. J. Beverton, Principal Scientific Officer, at the Lowestoft (Suff.) Fisheries Laboratory of the British Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries to take part in the cruise of the Arctic Research vessel "Ernest" which will visit Bear Island, possibly Spitzbergen.

Dr. O'Rourke, who has previously worked in the Arctic on both sides of the Atlantic, hopes to complete some research on insects which began in Lapland in 1948.

**MINISTER RECEIVES R.T.A. DEPUTATION**

Mr. Everett, Minister for Justice, received yesterday at Leinster House, Dublin, a deputation from the R.T.A. Transport Association.

Various matters affecting licensing road haulage were discussed, including the enforcement of the R.T.A. Transport Act 1933.

**Few Neutrals Now**

Mr. Dulles told the Press conference that membership in the United Nations barred neutrality, and since virtually all the free countries were in the world organisations, there were few, if any, neutrals.

Correspondents detected a disagreement with the stand of President Nixon when Mr. Dulles said he did not believe in every country a great danger was involved when free nations accepted Soviet aid. But he said, free nations must not be thought Soviet aid was for strong political purposes.

Mr. Dulles also endorsed President Nixon's statement during the Far East tour, that the world would be a better place if the Soviet Union, as desirable, countries which also obtained help from the Russians. In this connection, he said, Mr. Nixon had well-stated U.S. policies.
